# Project Overview

## Objective

Develop a controlled vocabulary of Indigenous Peoples of Alaska, using the names with which groups refer to themselves, incorporating guidance and input from Alaska Native organizations and individuals, establish a way to implement these terms in the Alaska Library Catalog and Alaska's Digital Archives, and petition the Library of Congress to add the new terms to the Library of Congress Subject Headings.

## Goals

- To draft an implementation plan to develop a controlled vocabulary containing the names of every Alaska Native group. The terminology will be compliant with Library of Congress Subject Headings conventions but structured according to how members of the groups prefer to be named, culturally sensitive, accurate, and representative of Alaska Natives.
- To develop a roadmap for the Alaska Library Catalog and Alaska's Digital Archives to use these terms and apply them to existing records in each collection.
- To work with the Alaska Library Catalog systems team to implement the use of this controlled vocabulary in the Alaska Library Catalog, a consortium of over 80 public, academic, special, and K-12 libraries who serve 92% of the population of Alaska through a shared catalog with 3.2 million titles.
- To work with the Alaska Digital Archives to implement the use of this controlled vocabulary in Alaska's Digital Archives, containing historical photographs, albums, oral histories, moving images, maps, documents, physical objects, and other materials from archives, museums, and libraries throughout Alaska.
- To enhance accessibility for Alaska Natives and researchers of Indigenous Alaskan cultures by implementing subject headings that are both culturally appropriate and commonly used.
- To develop a plan to petition the Library of Congress to add the new terms to the Library of Congress Subject Headings.

## Deliverables

- Guidelines for implementing culturally appropriate subject headings
- A database in accessible formats for importing the controlled vocabulary into the Alaska Library Catalog, Alaska Digital Archives
- A roadmap for the Alaska Library Catalog, Alaska's Digital Archives, and any other interested cultural institutions to use these terms and apply them to existing records in each collection
- A plan for petitioning the Library of Congress to add the new terms to the Library of Congress Subject Headings
- A plan to continue the maintenance and growth of the controlled vocabulary

## Technical Requirements

While our primary focus has been on the Alaska Library Catalog (ALC) and Alaska Digital Archives, we have received state, national, and international interest in the project. As not all libraries, museums, or archives are in the Alaska Library Catalog or are participating members of the Alaska Library Network (ALN), this project will require storage in a format that can be easily imported into various systems and needs to be publicly accessible.

Catalogers with Program for Cooperative Cataloging (PCC) training in either Name Authority Cooperative Program (NACO) or Subject Authority Cooperative Program (SACO) will need to petition the Library of Congress to correct their subject headings. We will need to ensure that our terminology is appropriately codified in MARC 21 Format for Bibliographic Data and compliant with Resource Description and Access (RDA) Standards and PCC Policy Statements (PCC PS) to ensure it can be easily adapted to the Library of Congress Subject Heading (LCSH) submission process.

Specifically for the Alaska Library Catalog and Alaska Digital Archives, this project will require the support of the ALC Cataloging Workgroup, ALC Critical Cataloging Workgroup, Alaska Digital Archives, and ALC Systems Administration to ensure the formats created can be imported and implemented into their systems.

The software MarcEdit will be necessary to convert all documentation into the appropriate formats.<sup>5</sup>

## Limits and Exclusions

The project is limited to drafting an implementation plan, case study, policies, and procedures, establishing a sustainable structure to develop and maintain a controlled vocabulary for a list of appropriate terminology for the prominent Alaska Native cultures, languages, and ANCSA (Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act) corporations, with a close examination of a single cultural or linguistic group. The vocabulary will then be expanded to represent all cultural and linguistic groups in the state, implemented in the Alaska Library Catalog and Alaska Digital Archives, and published for distribution.

## Approvals

Request review of terminology from Community Liaisons to ensure the newly created headings are culturally appropriate and commonly used before publishing.

For implementation into the Alaska Library Catalog (ALC), final approval will be sought from the ALC Cataloging Workgroup and ALC Critical Cataloging Workgroup.

Approval will be sought from the Alaska Digital Archives Project Manager for implementation in the Alaska Digital Archives.

# Alaska Native Subject Headings

## Guidelines

As librarians and archivists, we must ensure equitable access for all. We operate in a system that has systematically oppressed many. We can no longer accept the status quo and must work to change the course and establish an inclusive knowledge system. We acknowledge the harm done and that continues to be done against Alaska Natives and how Western knowledge systems have perpetuated, and continue to perpetuate, harm. In Libraries and Archives, one of the most visible ways this has been done is through pejorative or inaccurate descriptions and subject headings or an outright omission and erasure of the rich and diverse Indigenous cultures, languages, practices, and beliefs. We cannot, nor claim to, speak for Alaska Native Communities; however, we must listen and respect everyone we work alongside and remove the use of "outdated, inaccurate, derogatory, and Eurocentric language."<sup>6</sup>

Moving forward, we will work to organize and describe information with appropriate context and terminology, with culturally appropriate and accurate language. We will encourage our colleagues to implement equitable and culturally appropriate terminology. We will adhere to the Protocols for Native American Archival Materials,<sup>7</sup> the American Library Association's Code of Ethics,<sup>8</sup> the Culturally Responsive Guidelines for Alaska Public Libraries,<sup>9</sup> and the Cataloging Ethics Steering Committee's Cataloguing Code of Ethics<sup>10</sup> for an ethical and culturally responsive description of materials.

We will no longer rely upon literary warrant as a basis for subject headings regarding groups of people and instead will use the preferred terms. The concept of "literary warrant" was developed by librarian E. Wyndham Hulme (1859-1954) in 1911 and is a foundational principle for classification and is still in practice today in LCSH.<sup>11</sup> It insists that a heading is only warranted, found in published literature, and not in a conceptual format. However, when the published literature is inaccurate or degrades a specific group of people, culture, or belief, it cannot be considered an authoritative work, especially if the creator is not a part of that group or culture. To do this is to exclude oral traditions and is a Eurocentric and Westernized way of thinking.

## Terminology Metadata

All terms will need to be coded according to PCC PS and RDA standards. This will ensure that the terminology can be easily transferred to any petitions to LOC/LCSH, and imported into any catalog ILS or repository system.

## Review

Before implementing any terminology, the committee must work with community representatives to ensure that the new or existing terminology is appropriate and accurate. Two methods of review are currently being considered.

First is cataloger-led research, where the cataloger researches terms already described as known issues with publicly available research. The cataloger then investigates Library of Congress Authority Records, the catalog, and cites research found. If terms are inappropriate, they are noted, and the cataloger researches replacement terms. If the information on proper terminology is freely and publicly available, the cataloger will create a new heading based on the research and cited sources. The latest and old headings lists are then sent to the Community Liaisons for review.

The second method is report-led research. A librarian will run reports in the Alaska Library Catalog based on call number ranges. The list is then simplified and sent to the community Liaisons for review. Liaisons then do research and propose new terms in place. The cataloger then takes the proposals and analysis provided by the Liaisons and creates a structured heading. The structured subject heading is then sent to the Liaisons for final approval to ensure terminology is appropriately interpreted and applied.



Once reviewed, the committee must address and act upon any feedback from community representatives. The committee must respect the wishes and requests made. If a term is still deemed problematic or inaccurate, the committee will continue researching other alternatives that may be appropriately applied and still enhance access to the materials. Once the term is approved, the cataloger will add the terminology to the list, and the committee must implement practice to respond to any additional feedback from community members if the usage or spelling is no longer deemed appropriate days, months, or years later. The committee will do this via a reporting form to allow community input, whether a newly created Alaska Native Subject Heading or an existing Library of Congress Subject Headings needing review.

## Distribution

Once a term has been approved, it will be added to the controlled vocabulary and published. Institutions implementing the controlled vocabulary can be put on a listserv to be informed of additions, changes, or removals.

The terms must be coded in MARC and saved in the following downloadable formats:

- Excel (.csv and .xlsx)
- Word (.docx)
- MARC (.mrc)

The committee will look into the following formats as additional support:

- RDF XML
- N-Triples (.nt)
- JSON-LD
- TTL (.ttl)

MarcEdit,<sup>12</sup> a free editing software, will be used to assist with coding and exporting. Google Macros<sup>13</sup> can also help with extrapolating data into different types of lists (e.g., if only certain parts of the data are needed and not the complete MARC coding).
